EUROPEAN REGIONAL CONFERENCE 2007 – ADDRESS OF WELCOME

At the opening ceremony of the regional conference at St Mary's University College this year the address of welcome was given by the Vice Principal, Dr. Mary Eaton. This speech was very well received by the delegates who found it extremely thought provoking and appropriate for our Society. We were asked if the text could be reproduced in EuForia so that all our members in Europe could have the opportunity to read it.

Welcome to St. Mary's University College by the Vice-Principal, Dr. Mary Eaton

It is a pleasure and a privilege to welcome the members of Delta Kappa Gamma to St. Mary's University College.

This is, I think, a particularly appropriate venue for an international conference of women educators.

Education has been at the heart of our mission for over a century and a half.

St. Mary's was established in 1850 as a Catholic College for the training of teachers for the poor. That concern with outreach and widening participation, so current in today's debates about Education, was at the heart of our foundation over 150 years ago.

Of course when St. Mary's was founded in 1850 those being trained were all men. Nevertheless the College motto was – and remains –

Monstra Te Esse Matrem
Show Yourself to be a Mother

As you move about the College you will find that motto on old iron gates, above doorways and, of course, at the back of this chapel on the boards which list the names of our students who died in two world wars.

What does it mean – this exhortation to “Show yourself to be a mother”?

The first response to that question is that this is a line from the College hymn; a prayer to our patron: Mary; asking for her blessing and protection.

However, I think there is more to this motto.

I like to think that those men who in the early days of the College walked about with this motto on their blazers were, at some level, recognising the power of the feminine that lies within all of us: female and male.

Mothering, as an active force for good, is carried out by all who seek to nourish and nurture the young in their charge - and then to let them go free to take on the role of building communities and society.

“Monstra te esse matrem” is a prayer to Mary. It is also an exhortation to show those qualities of mothering in our work and in our lives.

In the 107 years since our foundation, St. Mary's has grown and developed. Established to train the teachers of the poor, we now offer a wide range of graduate and postgraduate programmes in Education, Humanities, Arts, Business, Law, Human Science and Sport Science

Over three and a half thousand students, men and women, from a wide range of backgrounds, and with a variety of experiences, attend St. Mary's University College today. But although we have grown in size our core values remain the same. We offer our students a university experience within the Catholic tradition and with a collegial ethos. We are proud of the high academic standard of our work in both teaching and research. However, students at St. Mary's are not only here to acquire a good degree. They are also here to experience and to contribute to a college community. This, we believe, is as vital a part of their education as the development of knowledge and skills. The values of collegiality: of care for others - both within and beyond St. Mary's - are central to the life of the college. In our mission statement we speak of “student-centred education” and of “developing the whole person”. Our academic staff are primarily teachers – focused on their students. Even the internationally recognised research of many of our colleagues does not detract from that student focus which is the core of all our endeavours.

And it is not only staff who are student-centred. We notice that our students show a care and concern for each other as well as a loyalty to the staff at the College. We encourage and try to develop this concern for others through the activities organised by the Chaplaincy and St. Mary's own charity: SHOC (Strawberry Hill Outreach Concern). Students become involved in working with the housebound; the sick; the homeless – those marginalised in a prosperous and competitive society. Students also become involved in SHOC's overseas projects – fundraising to build orphanages and schools. Some go out to these projects as volunteers for a summer or for a year. Some give their lives to such work.

Of course our students leave us and we are happy to see them go - to carry out the work for which we aim to prepare them. Mothering is about nurturing and teaching; imparting knowledge and values. It is also about letting go so that potential may be fully realised. Our students go on to be, we hope, active and contributing members of society. Some become household names and we are proud of them. The majority live lives of less recognition and we are proud of them. We are proud of all who contribute in whatever way, to the greater good.

All, we hope, will have benefited from being here and will remember St. Mary's with affection and respect. If our motto and our mission have lasting meaning it is the memories of those who have been here and who now take forward our work and tradition.

And I hope that you too will have good memories of your time here and of the work that you do here.

Before I sit down I would like to draw your attention to the stained glass which surrounds you. This is the work of Gabriel Loire, the celebrated glass maker who lived at Chartres during the latter part of the last century. You will find his work in large cathedrals and small churches; in colleges and public buildings across Europe and throughout the world. Here we see 15 windows which illustrate the decades of the Rosary: a prayer of meditation on the life of Mary. The prayer focuses on three stages:

Joyful events
Sorrowful events
Glorious events

This, I think, sums up the life of the mother/educator. Joy and sorrow are both part of that life: but properly used they lead to a transforming glory. As you leave this chapel today I invite you to look up and see something of that glory in the Great West Window – and recognise something of that glory in your own lives.

Dear Delta Kappa Gamma friends,

What an interesting and nice experience it was to join the European Conference in London. It was my first visit to a ΔΚΓ conference and I will never forget it; so many interesting female educators, so much information about our Society and its global activities.

Education is an interesting segment of daily life and it is necessary that everyone contributes to this field. With education there will be a brighter future for children, without there is none. Our Society knows the importance of education and could proudly tell that in this last year the members contributed over one million American dollars to educational projects, the Afghanistan project is particularly outstanding.

But not only the Society contributes, I assume that there are a lot of individual members who do so too. Let me tell you about an outstanding member from the Epsilon chapter in the Netherlands. Her name is Florence Naduk. She was born in Uganda and with her hazelnut coloured skin and her pretty laughter she brings a lot of joy into our chapter (I am a member of this chapter as well).

In her home town in Uganda children can attend school free, can stay there overnight, get a meal and share books, paper and pencils. They need to wear a school uniform, however, which is a difficult point because too many children cannot afford to buy one. Therefore, Florence started a foundation and tries to collect as much money as possible. Together with her board members she has inventive ways of collecting. One of their projects is a cooking project. One can hire them and they will come with pots and pans, in traditional clothes and cook a good Ugandan meal. With the collected money they buy mattresses, pencils, paper, and of course the uniforms. Once a year she takes all the things herself to Uganda to ensure they are collected and used safely and properly. At many of the Dutch events Florence asks us to donate for specific items. Last year at our state meeting we raised enough money for about 35 uniforms.

Florence really is a special person and we are glad she is a member of our Society.
