Dear Members of DKG Europe Region,

This is my first opportunity to write to you as your Regional Director. I feel honoured that you have given me this opportunity and responsibility. Please know that I am here for you, and to work on your behalf. I hope to represent Europe within the Society so that I am conveying your thoughts, ideas and wishes to the Administrative Board. I also want to help, advise or support you in any way that I can.

In Europe we are a very diverse group, with nine different languages and cultures. However, the one great thing we have in common is our love for, and interest in, education in our own countries and across the world. In a recent message to State Presidents, our new International President, Jensi Souders, writes about 'sharpening our focus':we need a common focus. Just as other organisations are known for an emphasis on one major project, so can we become known by gathering all our efforts into one unified effort.I hope we will find that common focus through supporting early-career educators.

Our International President's theme for her biennium, 'Embracing our Vision • Designing Our Future', covers two ideas which are important to all members of DKG. We were two from Europe in a group of 30 privileged women from all over the USA and enjoyed this excellent seminar enormously. I highly recommend European women to apply for this seminar which is held every other year.

Two DKG sisters in Iceland, An-Dao Tran from Gamma chapter and Anna G. Eðvaldsdóttir from Iota chapter got **scholarships** this year and we are very proud of them. Also we have four Icelandic sisters on International Committees next biennium and Sigrun Klara is on the Editorial Board for the next 4 years.

AYearforCommemoration

This year marks the anniversary of many achievements in Icelandic women's rights This year marks 95 years from women's right to vote, 80 years from the establishment of Kvenfélagasamband Íslands (*Federation of Icelandic Women's Societies*), 40 years from the establishment of the Red Stockings Movement, 35 years from the first Women's Day Strike, 30 years from the election of Mrs. Vigdis Finnbogadottir as president of Iceland, 20 years from the establishment of Stigamót (*Education and Counseling Center for Survivors of Sexual Abuse and Violence*), and 15 years from the approval of the Beijing Platform for Action, to name a few major events related to women's rights.

To honour these occasions many clubs and associations related to the women's movement have joined hands to plan an international calendar of events for October 24-25, with the slogan: Women Strike Back 2010, <u>http://kvennafri.is/en/int-conference</u>

Skottur is the sponsor of the Women's Day Off 2010. This unique platform is an executive body formed by all major women's movements and organisations in Iceland to sponsor joint equal rights campaigns. The name "skotturnar" refers to "skott-húfa", the head wear of the Icelandic national costume for women. DKG women will participate in that event along with most Icelandic women.



But there is more to celebrate: **The first DKG Chapter was established in Iceland 35 years ago** which can also be considered under this umbrella. On the 7th of November 1975 the Alpha Chapter was established. We are therefore celebrating the35th anniversary of Delta Kappa Gamma in Iceland this year. Alpha Chapter is planning this anniversary on 13th November with a seminar and other activities.

FINLAND

Finnish members thought that the program in Spokane convention was very professional and inspiring.
