ICELAND

We keep up traditional work in the chapters working with diverse and interesting topics. The very popular so called "book-meetings", we told you about in the January-edition last year, have been held in many chapters now at the beginning of the year. Then members share their opinions of interesting books they have read during Christmas or recently. In Iceland the majority of annually published books are published a few weeks before Christmas. In Icelandic we use the term "book-flood" to describe this phenomenon. The members' comments are collected and a list of interesting books is written up. Some chapters have been assessing the legislation recently passed for our entire school system, from early childhood education through university.

Many of our chapters have recently created and taken into use their home page with a support from Eygló Björnsdóttir, our webmaster and a member of the Beta Chapter. If you take a look at the Icelandic $\Delta K\Gamma$ website http://dkg.muna.is you see that each chapter has its own page under the hat of the Icelandic $\Delta K\Gamma$ State Organization. This seems to be working well and has been received very well by all.

During the autumn the chapters have been active in initiating new members and as a result we are gradually increasing in numbers. Hopefully this will continue and make it possible for us to reach our goal of 300 members in a year or two.

Our handbook is also being reviewed and our plan is to make it accessible on the State Organization website and not published in a booklet.

There is a genuine interest among the Icelandic DKG members to attend the European Regional Conference in Oslo next August. As many of you might know Icelandic financial circumstances have changed considerably since we met in London during the last European Regional Conference. This means that there is more uncertainty concerning our attendance than before. It will become clearer in the spring how many can attend.
