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Greetings from your Regional Director

My welcome and congratulations to the new State organisation Presidents in Europe. "Are we International?" The question was raised by the second vice President Dr. Sigrun Klara Hannesdottir at the Administrative Board meeting in Austin one week ago. Among all the countries of the world Delta Kappa Gamma is to be found in only 16. After 80 years this is the result of our expansion. Do we want to be international? The word is included in the Society name. But, cross your heart, to what extent do we have international issues on our chapter agendas? Are we international? This is a question to be considered.

The two and a half days long Administrative Board meeting included many questions and decisions. I would like to inform you about some of them.

- Heard reports from Durbin Studios concerning marketing items and from Greenlights for Non-profit Success concerning Headquarters' staffing.
- Revised the Policy for use of electronic communications and accepted recommendations updating Net Tools and continuing the Leadership suite.
- Afghanistan project ends 30th June 2009. A committee is gathering information and suggestions for further action. Report to Administrative Board will be give at its meeting 14th-16th January 2010.
- Determined that the Emergency Fund collection would be the sole recipient of funds at regional conferences.
- Strategic Plan for Success was updated. Out of reports given by the State organisation presidents in Europe we understood that many states have their own strategic plan. I do hope that the members are well informed about the contents.
- A Communication Services Administrator was hired. Her name is Linda Eller and she will begin her work in September 2009.
- A job description for the Bulletin Editor was agreed. The editor is to create a
 professional publication that enhances the academic standing of the Society, supports its
 purposes, helps accomplish Strategic Planning goals and provides members with
 specialized publishing opportunities. Dr. Lace Brogden has accepted to be the editor for
 one year.

And now to Norway:

The members of the organising committee for the regional Conference in Oslo have their hands full in working with the final issues. We are hoping to make the conference of high quality, both professionally and personally. Our aim is to "Activate your Visions". In the News you will find all detailed information.

Oslo is waiting for you and so am I!

Our archive has been rearranged. As we started in 1976 you can imagine how many papers we have gathered over the years. Too much to handle, so our vice president, who knows a lot about this subject, started the rearrangement project, of course with the help of some others. The result is overwhelming. The archive has become a beautiful overview, neatly organized in white boxes and will be assigned to our national archive for woman organisations.

It was also nice to read about the excellent women who founded $\Delta K\Gamma$ Netherlands and expanded the society in Holland. It was interesting to read what occurred in those years: the themes that were discussed, the growth, the decline and the founding of new chapters.

It was also interesting to see the ups and downs and to see that today is not the only risky period. There have in fact been many more, in particular when the membership numbers went down, but in the long run it always went up again. Now we are working on a booklet with stories from members from over 30 years of $\Delta K\Gamma$ Netherland's existence.

Food and sustainability were the topics of our convention at a beautiful castle in Baarn. This castle owned by our ministry of agriculture, food and environment is the educational platform used to expand their themes. More specifically, they also offer educational programmes for children and their parents. We made a nice deal with the organisation; If we could arrange a lecture about food and children and we would like to share this with the public, we would get good free publicity as well the use of their beautifull lectureroom. And so it went.. A nutritionist, working with and for schools gave the lecture. What have we learned? There is much to do when it comes to better nutrition for our youth. Sugar is very harmful, so never use prefab food. And of course, at the end everyone who attended got the $\Delta K\Gamma$ -elevator speeches.

During the convention we honoured our founder Anneke Bolle. Anneke is an excellent example of an outstanding woman. She believes in the effects of education. She believes in the goals of our society and puts a lot of effort into our organisation to reach these goals. It is a priviledge to have her as an honorary member.

An honorable membership for Anneke Bolle Wulff



During our State Convention on May 16 2009 The Netherlands State honoured Anneke for all she has done during her membership of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International and national.

Who is she?

In 1976 Anneke was invited together with 14 other educators to start Delta Kappa Gamma Nederland. Of all these "Founders" Anneke is the only one who is still a member. She participates now in Gamma chapter, The Hague.

What are her merits for our Society?

She was active at the international and regional as well as the national level. In the Netherlands she held all offices at chapter and state level. She was involved in founding four chapters between 1976 and 1980. Every time she was one of the chapter founders and assisted the new chapters by word and deed.

Between 1976 and 2002 she participated in all International Conventions and Regional Conferences. She was a keynote speaker, presided and presented many workshops, not only in the Northeast Region, which The Netherlands was part of until 1999 but also in other regions. Her favourite topic was "Europe, the fifth region". During the International Convention of 1998 "Europe, the fifth region" was settled.

Together with her Steering Committee she organized State conventions and European Meetings in Uithoorn, Noordwijk and Arnhem. These were the forerunners of the first Europe Regional Conference in 1999 in Breukelen, The Netherlands.

As European Representative she was the first Dutch representative at the International Administrative Board.

As a member of the International Expansion Committee she was involved in the start of Germany State 1992. She translated The Constitution and The Standing Rules into the German language.

For all the efforts she made for The Delta Kappa Gamma Society as a whole Canada donated in her honour a gratuity to The Educational Foundation. Europe honoured Anneke with "A Thank-you Charter of the European States" for all she had done for Europe.

These in a nutshell are all the things Anneke did for our Society.
