### Who Wants to be a Teacher?

As you have just read, this question will form the theme for the Forum session at Borås. It was triggered by an initial survey carried out by Estonia, described in their report in the Autumn edition of EuForia. I believe the work they started is important and merits examination throughout our region in view of the growing and changing population in all countries. Now, more than ever before, we need excellent educators in all areas of our education systems, and more of them! We have, therefore, to find out how we can attract the best students from our schools and colleges and to do that we need to find out their perception of our profession. I asked Estonia for permission to circulate their survey questions to all State Presidents and invited them to carry out the same survey in their own country so that we could analyse and compare the results. I am currently carrying out this task with the responses I have so far received in Great Britain. I am attaching a copy of the questionnaire with this edition of EuForia and would ask each country to consider participating in what I consider could be a worthwhile piece of research and an excellent subject for the 2015 Forum meeting.

# The Netherlands.

In November we had our general meeting in Zwolle. Our guest speaker was Albert Weishaupt. He is a lecturer at the Professional Education Organisation and Head of the Roelof van Echten College. The title of his speech was "Autonomy of the teacher". Ruby Trebels of Epsilon chapter wrote a report about his speech. You will find it below.

# ALBERT WEISHAUPT: "Autonomy of the teacher"



On 15 September in the newspaper *Dagblad van het Noorden* was an article entitled "The quality of education has to improve". It was an interesting article. The more so because Dutch teaching professionals were invited to attend a meeting of Noordelijk Onderwijs Peil (Northern Educational Level). Guest speaker Albert Weishaupt would speak on the subject "Better teachers, better education". Unfortunately I hesitated a day too long and was too late to subscribe. I was pleasantly surprised when I

heard that Albert Weishaupt would attend as a guest speaker at our general meeting of members of DKG in Zwolle. Completely excited I travelled to the capital of Overijssel. My expectations were fulfilled.

When Mr. Weishaupt came forward and spoke to us, I immediately noticed his energetic enthusiasm. I saw an inspirational person with a good sense of humour. Albert Weishaupt is a lecturer at the Professional Education Organization and Head of the Roelof van Echten College. As an education manager his opinion is surprising. He states that the autonomy has to return to the teacher and the teacher has to take her responsibility. What does education need? Weishaupt says: normative professional teachers and creativity. What does he mean by this? What is a normative professional teacher? A characteristic of a good teacher is that the teacher should strive to become a better teacher. In addition, the teacher should use norms and values. The teacher must use research and reviewed knowledge. Know what you are doing and why you are doing it. The teacher is part of the team. Education is a shared responsibility.

The question remains whether we take our responsibility. Weishaupt states that education does not do this. The problem, however, does not lie with the teacher but with policy makers. Weishaupt is charmed by the book *Leiding geven aan professionals? Niet doen!* (*Managing professionals? Don't!*) written by Mathieu Weggeman. Weishaupt agrees with Weggeman's statement. He also says: "Ask the teacher. She knows ". Policy makers need to position professional competence better. Weishaupt believes that research should directly contribute to solutions in education. The research should be linked to daily issues. The organization must be considered as a working area and less as a business. "Education is not malleable". The result of malleable thinking is that a make-believe world has been created for government and politics.

The conclusion of Weishaupt is that attention must be paid to a professional organization. What is a professional organization? The attitude of a teacher must be an inquisitive attitude, a behaviour that puts the highest demands on her. The teacher should claim her space and should be responsible for

good education. A tool to assess this is not about the teacher but by the teacher. Create educational moments and not reviews. Give the teacher space and trust. As a manager, don't be a control freak. Albert Weishaupt concluded his speech with the call: "Take the accountability of your responsibility. Know what you should be responsible for. Put children in the first place. We focus on them and we are giving our power to the children. Good figures for the inspection will follow, because each teacher strives for good teaching." I agree that I should go for good education. For me this means seeking a dialogue with teachers and see class visits as a collegial consultation.

# Ruby Trebels, Chapter Epsilon

Dutch Epsilon Chapter makes a modest contribution to an inclusive society: Our way of being Charlie

Last year our Epsilon Chapter from Groningen, The Netherlands was already determined: next year we will aim to be in line with one of the DKG goals, contribute to the community. We looked at projects in Africa and China and also in our own community and decided for the



latter. We wanted to help out in our community and at the same time make this local community more familiar with DKG.

Once that was decided we got in touch with different organisations and in the end chose to collaborate with the association "Lezen en Schrjven" (Reading and Writing ) for three reasons:

- 1. The association is convinced, just as our Epsilon members are, that poverty and exclusion from a community can often be solved by educating people. Education starts with making sure everybody knows the local language such as immigrants, refugees and people asking for asylum in our country.
- 2. People from abroad can only be really included in the Dutch community if they read and write the local language.

Thus the link with education and DKG is evident and important to our chapter .

3. The contact person of the organisation "Lezen en Schrijven" was agreeable and the association with a Dutch princess as a patron proved to be very reliable and energetic.





In order to make money for a contribution a committee was installed in the first chapter meeting this year and one of our long time members Meemanaat, driven by her own experience as illiterate (in Dutch) when coming to The Netherlands, was literally unstoppable and very efficient. She decided to make and sell Christmas decorations on two occasions: the national annual meeting and the third chapter meeting of the year close to Christmas. She managed to convince retailers to give her, or rather our good cause, massive discounts, she hired (for free) a professional to help members make beautiful Christmas decorations, hired a room (for free), and brought materials, drinks and snacks. The rest of the committee and the chapter were "allowed" to help and did so with great pleasure.

Both activities were good fun and generated a profit of over 500 euro, a modest contribution that can only grow since our national committee has encouraged us to ask for a grant. It has already been decided that the money is to be spent on the purchase of books for the asylum seekers, immigrants and refugees in our part of The Netherlands

### Estonia

### Achievements contributing to educational excellence!

On September 12, 2014 Anu Sepp defended successfully her PhD dissertation *From music syllabi to teachers' pedagogical thinking: a comparative study of Estonian and Finnish basic school music education* at Helsinki University .This study represents comparative education research focusing on music syllabi and the pedagogical thinking of music teachers of basic schools in Estonia and Finland. Music in Estonia is a compulsory subject throughout basic schooling, in Finland the subject is optional from grade 8 onwards. The main objectives of the music syllabi in both countries confirm the idea of musicianship: engaging pupils in the real world of music by singing, playing instruments, listening to various styles and genres of music, and expressing their own ideas through improvisation, composition and movement. The pedagogical thinking and use of music practices in the two countries also revealed similar tendencies. The thesis has provided a model that can be used for researching on all teachers' pedagogical thinking and opportunities to improve teachers' professionalism. The thesis was supervised by Inkeri Ruokanen and Heikki Ruismäki (Helsinki University). Anu's research activities were supported by DKG A. Margaret Boyd scholarship.

On October 28, 2014 Katrin Kalamees-Ruubel defended her Ph D thesis *The role of Estonian and Literature in the curricula for general comprehensive schools (with instruction in Estonian) in 1917-2014. Historical-analytical approach* at Tallinn University. The research provides an overview of historical development of learning the Estonian language and literature, its foundations and principles of the selection of the content by the analysis of educational documents regulating school practice. A well-argued analysis of three historically different periods provides context for comprehension of the developments. As a result, she presents principles for selecting the content for learning the mentioned school subjects, which can be used for future curriculum development, not only for Estonian general comprehensive schools but also for teachers' pre-service as well as inservice training for future. The thesis was supervised by Leida Talts (Tallinn University) and Urve Läänemets (Estonian Academy of Music and Theatre). Katrin enjoyed the support of DKG International Annie Webb Blanton scholarship.

Congratulations to both of them! They have demonstrated by their achievement that DKG sisters deserve to be called key women educators.
