# Creative Program Supports **Connecting Educators**

Michigan's Mu chapter developed an idea for supporting educators in their community. It was so successful at the chapter level that Michigan has adopted it as a state project. The program is called the "Ten Interesting Women Model." Here is how it works as reported by Dr. Dorothy Sample, immediate past president of the chapter:

Five members of the chapter collaborated to invite five currently working teachers and/or administrators to meet after work for a light dinner. Each DKG member sent a letter to someone she knew who was teaching or working in education. The opening line said, "Some professional educators and I would like to gather ten interesting women together to share what is happening in education today. I think you are an interesting woman, and I would like to ask you to participate." The response was superb.

The first gathering was a time with no periences. After introductions, there was free-flowing talk about what was happening in the classrooms today. The purpose was to encourage working professionals, find ways DKG members could help them and to inform retired educators of the changes in classrooms of today. The sharing provided two-way learning.

The gatherings have continued and grown. Invitees are aware of the Society, and some have expressed a desire to become members. This is just a welcomed byproduct of a strong effort to retain teachers in the profession and to provide support for educators.
