Schools for Africa Project Grows With Contributions

as your chapter participated in the Schools for Africa project? Approximately \$10,000 has been collected thus far by chapters throughout the Society. Chapters and members are encourged to send contributions directly to International Headquarters. UNICEF expects to reach around 150,000 people living in emergency conditions in 2011, including 80,000 children.

What can your money do? Ten dollars provides a learner kit for one student in Mozambique and Mali which contains a bag, stationery, mini atlas and math tables. Learning materials for ten children in Zimbabwe and Malawi can be purchased for \$45.
